## **Technical Talk & Tips** By Wayne R. Suite

This is the first in a continuing series of articles which I will be providing for the club newsletter with the goal of helping us to understand how our metal detectors think and what they are trying to tell us. If each of us, understands just a little more of how our machines think and operate we may be able to apply this to our field experiences which could result in more productive hunting.

Have you ever wondered how in the world there could be a dime near that quarter in the hole where you just couldn't decide whether you should dig it or pass it when you heard the broken up sound in your headphones?

You are using headphones, right? Headphones enable us to focus on the language of the machine and choosing the right ones or creating the right ones will go a long way in making our treks more productive and enjoyable.

Treks into the field, how enjoyable it is to hit the local playground on a cold day knowing that the soft wood filling the city so nicely provided will make easy pickings of coins lost by others during their entertainment. Coins, or rings, or maybe even a wad of paper money held together with a money clip or for that matter a paper clip could be just lying their awaiting us regardless of which machine or how much we paid for it as long as we know what it is trying to tell us.

The creation of the dreaded pull-tab in its endless shapes, sizes, densities, and mutations lurk in almost any area we hunt today. The manufacturers of detecting machines have designed our best friend and our worst enemy, and the name of this feature is discrimination! Discrimination can save your back and leg muscles at the end of a long hunting day, or it can cause you to pass right over that gold ring that Martha dropped in the playground while catching her 3 year old daughter at the lower end of the slide. Yes, discrimination can cause you to dig 8 inches only to find a corroded heavy metal pull-tab or it can speed your hunting by passing over 30 pull tabs in a soda rest area. Our best friend and worst enemy!

Another Day to Store away in My Memories

On Friday, at the club meeting, I had talked to Andy Mesaros about doing some metal detecting on my next couple of days off from work. Andy called on Sunday and said he had been up for a long time and was not going to be able to meet on Monday, but would like to meet on Tuesday. Andy mentioned that he had talked to Dave Totzke and knew that Dave was also not going to be able to hunt on Monday.

We made plans to meet at a lot that we had hunted a few times before. Louis Murray and I had hunted this lot before and I had found a 1919 Canadian Quarter on it. I knew that Andy had found a Silver Roosevelt Dime on the lot and I believe Dave had found some silver on the lot also. There had been some Wheat Pennies found on the lot and several new coins.

I told Andy that I would call Dave and let him know of the plans to meet on Tuesday. On Monday morning I gave Lewis a call and asked him if he wanted to go hunting. He was not going to be able to hunt on either day. I didn't have any particular place in mind, but was planning on going somewhere. I called Dave and told him what the plan was for Tuesday. Things did not work out for Monday. I ended up doing chores around the house, so I was ready to hunt on Tuesday.

On Tuesday morning, I was the first to arrive at the lot. I had already started hunting as I saw Andy pull up. Then Dave drives up. He tells Andy, that a friend of his has told him about a fresh lot that is not too far away. We drive over there and cannot find it. While driving around, I see a lot and suggest that maybe that's the lot that Dave's friend had seen. Andy says that the lot I spotted was an old lot and had been hunted already. We drive back to the first lot.

Dave wants to know, are we going to put in a dollar for the oldest coin? I reluctantly agree as I always do, because when hunting with these guys, I usually go home a dollar short. We hunt for a while and nobody is finding anything except new coins. Dave announces that he has found a 1918 wheat penny. I am thinking to myself, well there goes my dollar. Every once and a while I look over at Dave. He appears to be smiling. I look over at Andy and he is kicking a dirt clod. Well at least I am not the only one that doesn't like Dave any more.

We get tired of that lot and decide to go over to the lot that I had spotted earlier. When we got there, I noticed that it wasn't as fresh as I first thought it was. I saw dig holes. They had been covered back up, but you could tell someone had been there before. We hunted for a little while and found more new coins. Andy says it's time for him to go. He pays Dave his dollar. Dave and I continue to hunt. Dave says, I bet you can find a hundred memorial pennies on any of these lots around here. Bingo, I find a wheat penny. When I tell Dave that I found a Wheat Penny, I think I see him starting to shiver and shake. I can almost read his mind. He is thinking, is it older than my 1918? A sigh of relief comes over him as I tell him it's a 1944. We continue to hunt. A short time later, Dave says he has to leave. He has to get to work. I'm not sure, I think the pressure is starting to get to him. He is probably thinking that my next Wheat Penny may be older than his 1918. I tell Dave, that I don't have any money on me, that I am going to have to owe him the dollar. He doesn't fall for it. I pay up and he leaves. I think I see him laughing as he is driving away. Now, I know I really don't like him.

I turn around and continue to hunt. It has not been more than 10 minutes since Dave left and I have not gone more than 15 feet. I get a signal. It's a solid signal. It seems to be a little weaker than some of the other signals. I dig and out pops an Indian Head Cent. The date is hard to see.

After I get it home and clean it up a little bit, the date turns out to be 1894. I thinking to myself, I sure am glad those guys had to leave and I was the one that got to dig it up. I am Happy again and you know Dave's not such a bad guy after all.

It is my 29<sup>th</sup> Indian Head Cent and the 17<sup>th</sup> pre 1900 coin that I have found.

There are thousands of those old lots all over the city. I am sure you know the ones I am talking about. The ones that everyone drives by and says that's an old lot, It's been hunted already. Those lots got hunted when they were fresh and then forgotten about. Now ask yourself this? Who hunted it and how thorough did they hunt it? Did they hunt real quickly and then race off to the next lot? What did they miss? Maybe they missed an 1894 Indian Head Cent.

One of the oldest legends in history is the story of the Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse, who appear just before some great catastrophe, as a warning to the entire world. From time immemorial, the Four Horsemen have stood for War, Famine, Pestilence and Death. Today, in these apocalyptic times, the Four Horsemen appear before hobbyists as completely different entities.

The first Horseman as determined by the hobbyist/collector is the archaeologist. He is very jealous of anything old and believes that everything should be discovered by and recovered by him. He has also been known to occasionally have a collection of wonderful finds hidden down in his personal basement. The archaeologist is the only horseman that I feel has any right to dissuade our hobby. He is one who should be tolerated because his work is actually needed. However, but he is an overachiever. It is "all or nothing" for him and you know which one of those he preaches.

The second Horseman is the environmentalist. He covets everything green (or brown, or gray). He is also known as a Tree-hugger, and for good reason. It's no stretch to apply the same thinking to metal detector hobbyists. They are so involved in their hobby that they simply don't see the gorilla.
